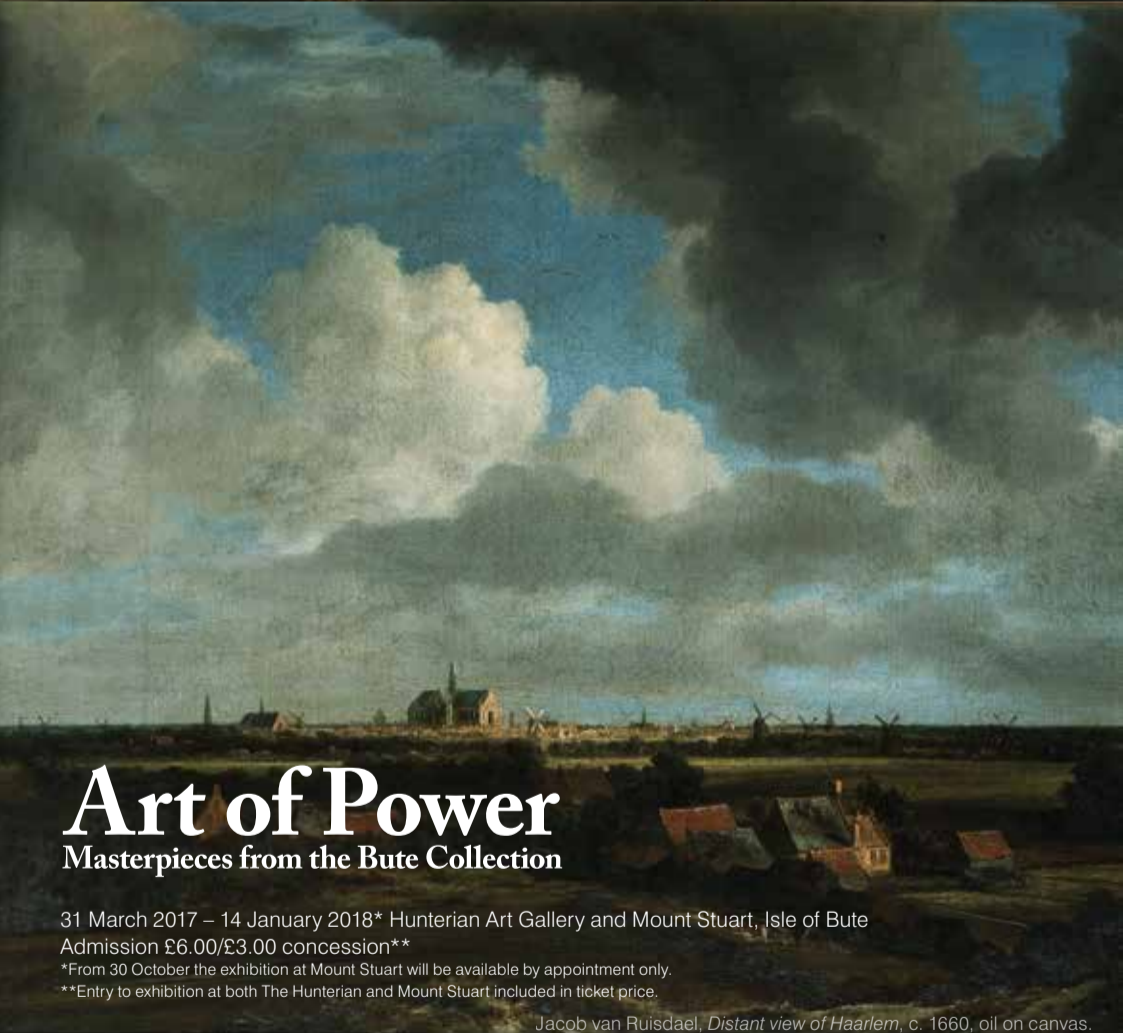

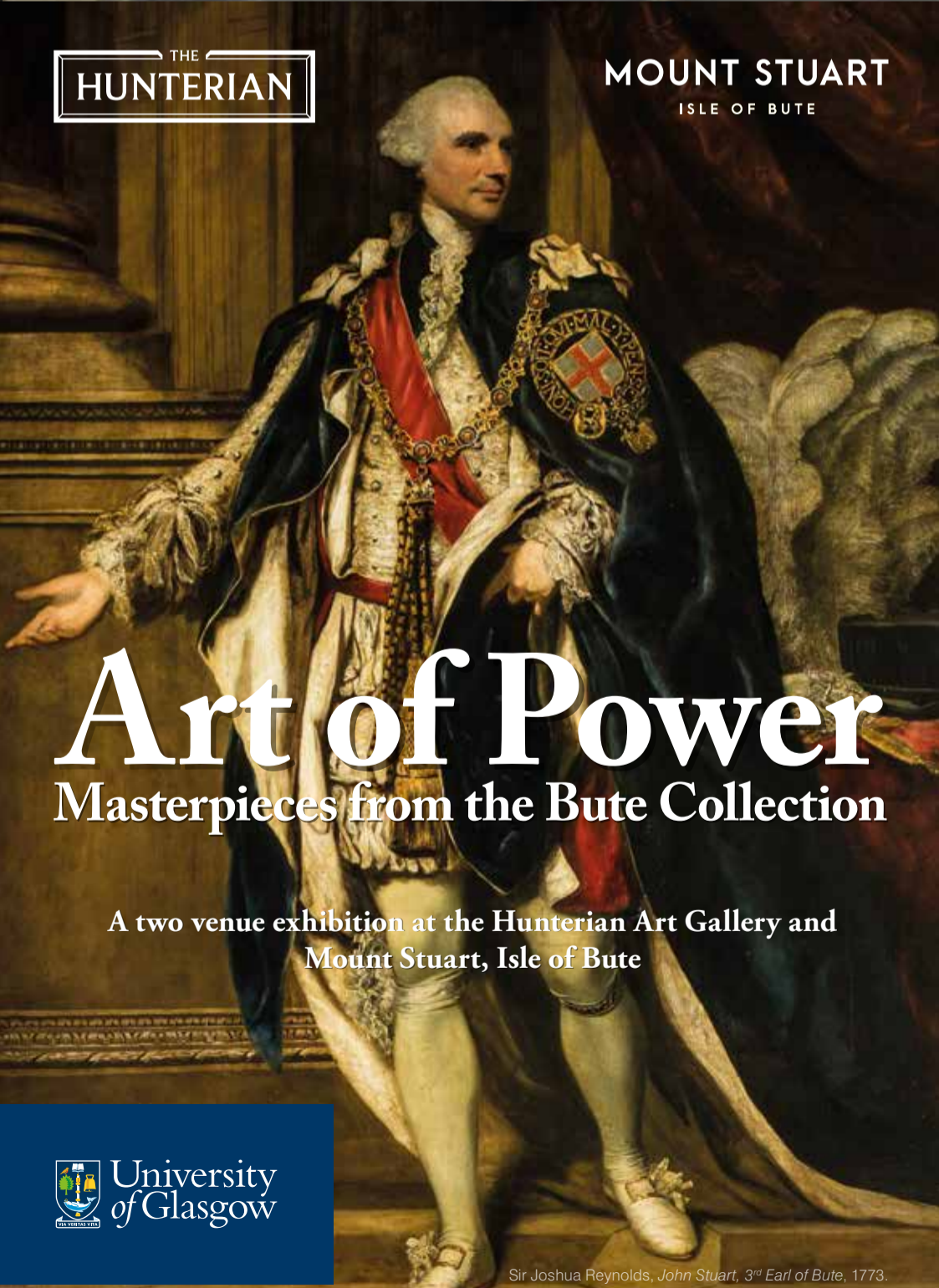

This two venue exhibition offers a unique opportunity to see major paintings from the Bute Collection at Mount Stuart, one of the foremost private collections in the UK.

The exhibition reveals a selection of rarely-seen masterpieces collected by the fascinating Enlightenment figure, John Stuart, Third Earl of Bute (1713-1792). After retiring from politics Bute amassed a great art collection, which was particularly renowned for its Dutch and Flemish paintings.

Art of Power is split across two venues, The Hunterian and Mount Stuart and the ticket price covers entry to the exhibition at both.



How to get to the Hunterian Art Gallery

The Hunterian is part of the University of Glasgow. The Hunterian Art Gallery, Mackintosh House and our Museums are located on the Gilmorehill campus, 3km west of Glasgow city centre.

To reach The Hunterian by subway, the closest station is Hillhead. www.spt.co.uk/subway

By bus, First Bus numbers 4 and 4A operate from the city centre to University Avenue. www.firstgroup.com/greater-glasgow

The University is signposted locally. Limited pay-and-display parking on University Avenue and adjoining streets on weekdays. Free parking on campus at weekends - enter main University campus via University Avenue.

THE HUNTERIAN

The Hunterian is Scotland's leading university museum and art gallery. Built on the founding bequest of pioneering anatomist and obstetrician William Hunter, it is home to over a million magnificent items ranging from meteorites to mummies and Mackintosh.

The Hunterian Art Gallery boasts one of the most distinguished public art collections in Scotland with works ranging from Rubens and Rembrandt to the Scottish Colourists and Glasgow Boys. It also features the world's largest permanent display of the work of James McNeill Whistler, the largest single holding

of the work of Charles Rennie Mackintosh and The Mackintosh House, the reassembled interiors from his Glasgow home.

While on campus you may also like to visit the Hunterian Museum in the historic Gilbert Scott building. Featuring stunning displays of archaeology, palaeontology, geology, zoology, entomology, ethnography and numismatics, the Museum also has highly acclaimed permanent galleries dedicated to Roman material from the Antonine Wall, the history of medicine in the west of Scotland and Lord Kelvin's scientific instruments.



MOUNT STUART

Mount Stuart, Britain's most spectacular Victorian Gothic house, is the architectural fantasy of the 3rd Marquess of Bute (1847-1900) and his architect Sir Robert Rowand Anderson.

Subsequent generations have continued to improve and renovate the building, the formal gardens, woodland and beaches overlooking the Firth of Clyde. Formerly a family home, Mount Stuart is now open to the public and focuses its activities on education, arts and community outreach.

Just 90 minutes away from Glasgow, Mount Stuart offers a memorable day out for the whole family, with something for everyone. Walks on the beach, discoveries in the gardens, dazzling interiors and unique architectural details, seasonal events and exhibitions make Mount Stuart a place that captures the imagination.



How to get to Mount Stuart

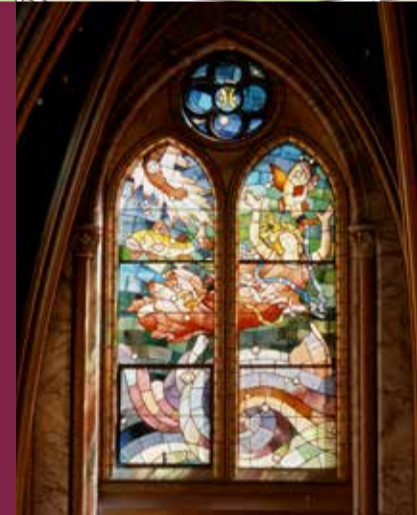
Mount Stuart is located on the Isle of Bute, the most accessible island off the west coast of Scotland. Public transport links to Mount Stuart are fully integrated, ensuring that visitors can get here quickly and easily.

The Isle of Bute is approximately 90 minutes away from Glasgow by road/rail and ferry. A regular return service to Wemyss Bay runs from Glasgow Central station. www.scotrail.co.uk

Caledonian MacBrayne (Calmac) operate two ferry routes offering a frequent daily service to the Isle of Bute - Wemyss Bay to Rothesay (approximately 35 minutes) and Colintraive to Rhubodach (less than 5 minutes). Mount Stuart is 5 miles south of Rothesay and is well signposted from the ferry terminal. www.calmac.co.uk

Parking is available at Mount Stuart within the vicinity of the Visitor Centre - courtesy transport available from the Visitor Centre to the main house. Pre-booked coach parking and blue badge parking available near the house.

Mount Stuart is 12 minutes from Rothesay by bus. West Coast Motors operate service 90/490 (493 on Sundays) to Kilchatian Bay from a stop outside the ferry terminal. www.westcoastmotors.co.uk
