
Conference Round-up

Natthamon, Amna and Aula presented posters while Phimmadda (pictured) and Chris delivered talks.




Kathryn (pictured), Gerard and Joanne attended the **American Association for Cancer Research's Annual Meeting** in San Diego, USA in April.

Kathryn presented her work on therapeutic biomarkers in bowel cancer and Gerard presented on predictive biomarkers on behalf of the INCISE collaboration.




Pamela gave a talk on the use of human tissue in research at the Scottish Association of Histotechnology's 45th Scientific Meeting in Edinburgh in June.

Funding Round-up

2024 has been a fantastic year for securing funding to advance our research and public engagement efforts. This year, we received funding from:

- Cancer Research UK to study patient response to radiotherapy in rectal cancer.
- Medical Research Council to explore a new treatment for inflammatory-driven cancers.
- **Guts UK** to use cutting-edge techniques to study individual cells in tissue from polyps, aiming to predict which patients are at high risk of developing future polyps or bowel cancer.
- **Cancer Research UK** to explore how the immune system interacts with bowel polyps.
- University of Glasgow MVLS Engage to support development and delivery of "Polyp Patrol" (see page 2).
- **Bowel Cancer UK** to investigate participants' experiences of colonoscopy surveillance.
- Beatson Cancer Charity to support the Glasgow Tissue Research Facility to invest in cutting-edge digital pathology technology.

- **Biochemical Society** to support delivery of "Polyp Patrol: On the Move", a schoolfocused extension of our public engagement activity educating children about bowel cancer and cancer research.
- **BASO/Rosetrees** to explore breast cancer surgery outcomes.
