Named after the migrating bird of the Nordic regions, Tern is a 5-piece band composed of Rose Logan (fiddle), Kristina Leesik (fiddle), Lea Søndergaard Larsen (bodhran), Miguel Girão (guitar) and BBC Radio Scotland Young Traditional Musician of the Year 2023 Amy Laurenson (piano).

Tern crafts contemporary arrangements of traditional and original material, which draw on the music of Shetland, mainland Scotland and Scandinavia. Exploring the connections between the music of their homelands, Tern challenges listeners, inviting audiences on an exciting, cross-cultural journey, deeply rooted in a Nordic soundscape.




CHORAL CONTEMPLATIONS VI: THE REDHILL PASSION

Alastair Savage is originally from Ayrshire and has performed traditional and classical music throughout his life. He was winner of the Land O' Burns Scots fiddle competition in his youth and has been a member of the BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra since 1997, touring Japan, China, South Korea, USA, South America and throughout Europe. As traditional fiddle soloist, he has broadcast on BBC Radio 3, BBC Radio Scotland, on national radio in the USA and has made seven critically acclaimed albums featuring the great Scots fiddle composers of centuries past alongside his own unique compositions.



WEDNESDAY ORGAN SERIES



VENUES

Concert Hall

The University Concert Hall is located in the Gilbert Scott Building on University Avenue. It is situated directly below the Hunterian Museum and can be accessed from the Quadrangles, the Hunterian staircase or by the Hunter Halls entrances. The lift is shared with the Hunterian Museum, which is situated in the undercroft to the right. Take the lift to Floor 2 for the Concert Hall. Toilets are directly outside the lift

Cloisters

The University Cloisters can be found in the centre of the outdoor Quadrangles in the Gilbert Scott Building area, below the Bute Hall.

University Memorial Chapel

The University Memorial Chapel is located in Professors' Square, to the right of the Gilbert Scott Building if University Avenue is behind you. There is wheelchair access via the Quadrangles around the back of the Chapel.
